1. <u>Course Overview</u>

Welcome to Torts! This course is designed to teach you the fundamentals of tort law. Torts is one-semester, four-credit course.

2. <u>Course Objectives & Learning Outcomes</u>

By the end of this course students will:

- Understand the principles of fault-based liability and liability without fault in tort law;
- Understand tort claims, privileges, and defenses and their elements;
- Understand the rationales and policies underlying liability for intentional torts, negligence, and liability without fault in tort;
- Be able to identify and analyze tort claims, privileges, and defenses in unique fact scenarios and;
- Identify and analyze the rationales and policies underlying tort liability in novel fact scenarios; and,
- Apply/argue how those elements, rationales, and policies to novel fact scenarios.

4. <u>Course Requirements</u>

<u>Class Attendance</u>: You are expected to attend class on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays from 10:45 a.m. – 12:05 p.m. Attendance will be taken by way of an attendance sheet that students must sign. You may not sign the attendance sheet for anyone else. If you do not sign the attendance sheet, you will be counted as absent. If you arrive to class more than 10 minutes late, you may not sign the attendance sheet. In that case, you will be counted as absent (though you may, and should, stay for class). If you leave class more than 10 minutes early, you will be counted as absent regardless of whether you signed the attendance sheet. If you miss more than 25% of classes (i.e., 10 classes), you will automatically fail the course. You must also comply with the LAW STUDENT HANDBOOK, Section IV.C regarding regular attendance.

<u>Preparation & Participation</u>: You are expected to be prepared for each class, have read all the assigned reading, and participate in class by asking and answering questions and raising points for discussion as appropriate.

In this course, students will be called on to participate but should feel free to ask questions and raise points on their own throughout the class. All students are expected and required to be respectful of each other and the ideas, questions, and views raised in class.

Both the tests given during the semester and the final exam will be modified open-books exams. For the final exam, you will also be allowed to bring a

20-page (front and back) hard copy outline for use during the exam. All outlines will be collected at the end of each test/exam. Note that to take these tests and the final exam, you must sign a pledge acknowledging that you have complied with the Law School's attendance policy and will comply with the Law School Honor Code.

The two multiple choice tests given during the semester will constitute 10% of your final grade. The final exam will constitute 90% of your final grade. Also, your class participation may be considered as part of your grade. Your course participation, or lack of, can raise or lower your grade as much as half of a letter grade.

Practice Exam: In addition, to provide you with an opportunity to practice taking a law school essay exam, I will administer a practice essay exam that will not be graded. See below for the date. I also will, as much as possible, provide you with application hypothetical questions to work through in class so that you can practice applying the principles of tort law to novel fact scenarios.
